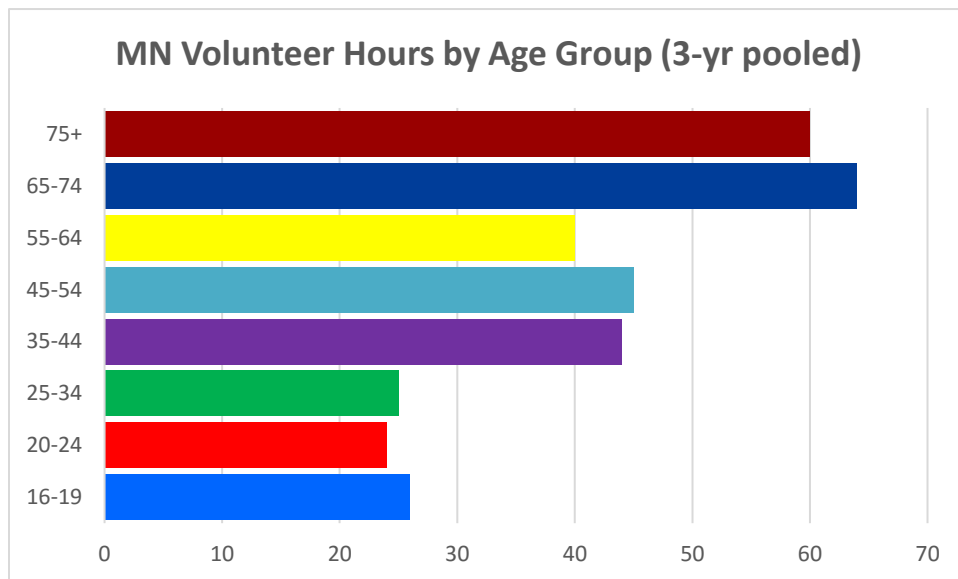
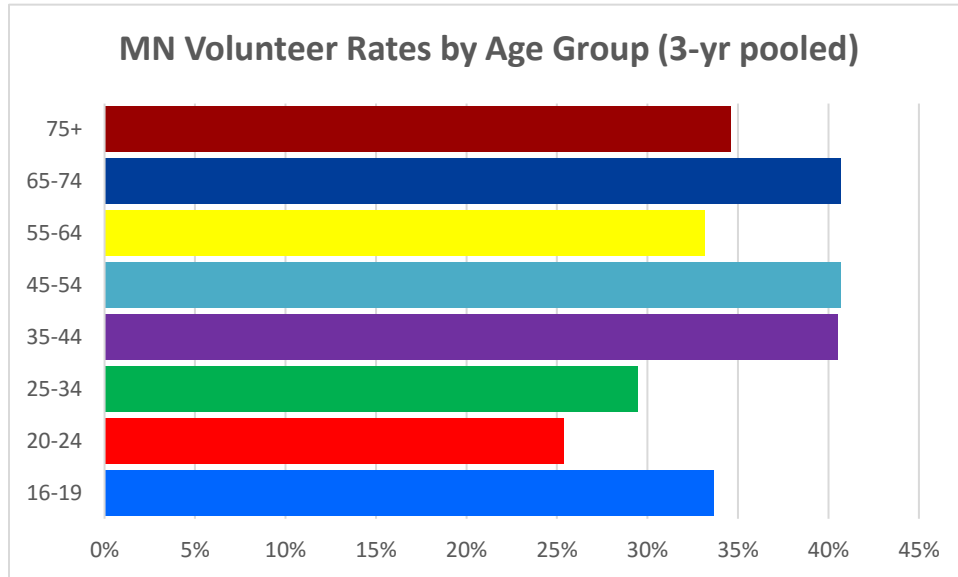


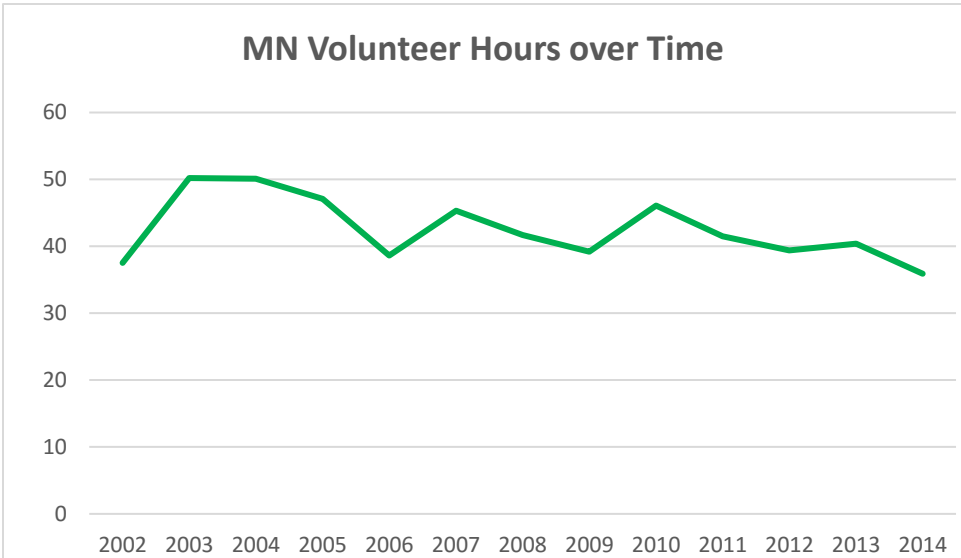
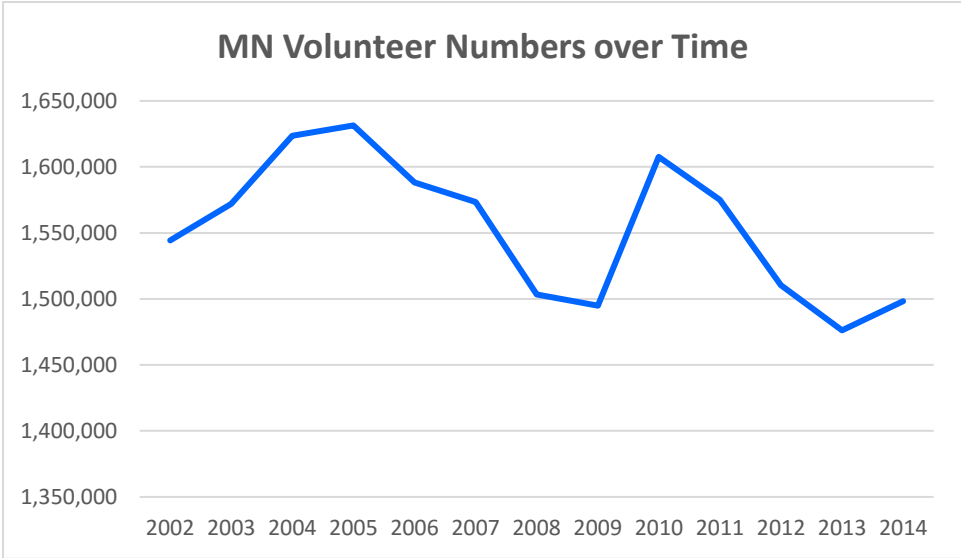
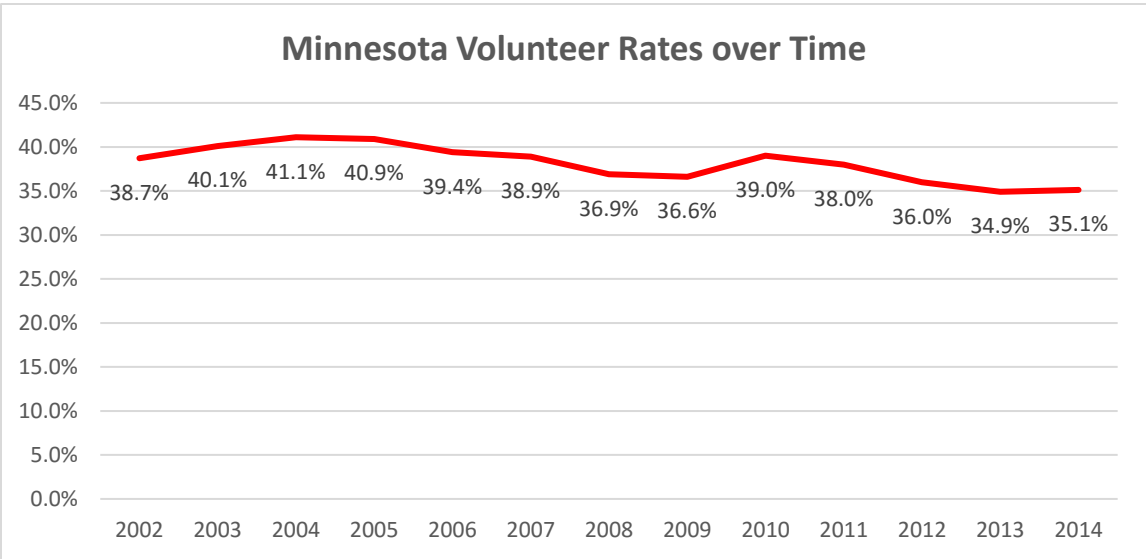




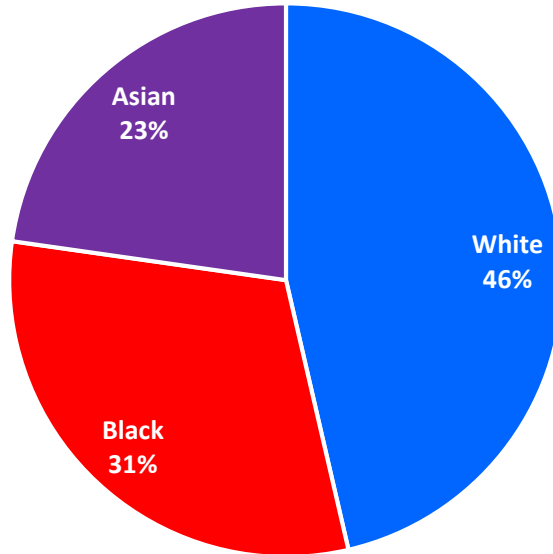
## 2. Minnesota

Overall, Minnesota ranks #4 nationally in volunteerism, with 35.3% volunteerism. Minnesota ranks in the top 10 of US states for all but one category of volunteers: older adults (#2), baby boomers (#8), millennials (#7), teenagers (#9), parents (#5), and veterans (#8); for college students, Minnesota ranks #17. (Rankings are based on a [three-year moving average](#).)
