Here's what you told us are important issues to you, the members:

- Globally: Climate Change, World Peace.
- Nationally: Women's Rights, Women's Health and Reproductive Freedom, Threats to Democracy
- Statewide: Public Education, Transit & Mobility, Homelessness, Environmental Issues, Children's Issues

Upcoming Efforts:

Local Advocacy: The Action Team is beginning to develop an approval process for local advocacy efforts in the name of LWV MEPH. More to come on this in January.

Legislative Interviews:

- The LWV MEPH Action Team will be organizing an information-gathering interview with Representatives Laurie Pryor 48A, Carlie Kotyza-Witthuhn 48B, and Senator Steve Cwodzinski 48, time and place TBD.
- St Louis Park LWV is holding a town hall on January 17 from 6-8pm in the SLP city hall council chambers to hear from representatives Ryan Winkler 46A, and Cheryl Youakim, 46B and Senator Ron Latz.
- Wayzata-Plymouth LWV will interview Senator Paul Anderson 44 and Representatives Ginny Klevorn 44A and Patty Acomb 44B and Jerry Hertaus 33A.

If you'd like to take part in these interviews, a great, low pressure way to develop a relationship with your elected officials while learning where they stand on important issues, let us know.

LWV MN Observer/Lobbyist Corps:

We've got 3 members of LWV MEPH taking part in the LWV MN Observer/Lobbyist Corps! We'll be attending committee meetings in the coming state legislative session, keeping an eye on what's happening and reporting back to LWV MN. Those who are on the lobbyist corps may occasionally provide testimony on League positions on critical legislation. This is a great way to build our advocacy muscles and get to know how our government really works, and most important, to make a real difference in what the government enacts!

There is still time to register and be trained for the corps. The next training session (on-line only) is January 5, 2019, from 1:00-3:30 pm. CMAL Study on Metropolitan Council Governance

Our Council of Metropolitan Area Leagues is wrapping up a study of the Metropolitan Council Governance. What's that about, you wonder? Well, it's been a political issue because the Met Council is entirely appointed by the Governor, not elected, yet has powerful authority over all the metro-area cities on matters involving the 25-year comprehensive plan, transit and wastewater management.

The study surveyed city Mayors and Managers about their thoughts on the Met Council Governance and working relationship. CMAL will host a workshop on Saturday, Jan. 5, 2019 to prepare Local League delegates for a consensus meeting. Peggy Kvam, LWV MEPH President, plans to attend this. Then Peggy will lead LWV MEPH Members in a presentation of the study and our consensus meeting on Monday, Feb. 4 at 3:00-5:00PM. We will meet at the Ridgedale

Library in the Lady Slipper Room 275. Please attend the consensus meeting, to express your thoughts on how the Metropolitan Council should be governed!

Met Council Survey Questions:

- Please rate the Met Council's current effectiveness overall
- Please list one or two areas where the Met Council is working effectively
- Please list one or two areas where the Met Council is not working effectively
- Please rate the degree to which the Met Council has impacted your city or county
- Please list one or two positive impacts the Met Council has had on your city or county
- Please list one or two negative impacts the Met Council has had on your city or county
- The Met Council is currently comprised of 16 members plus a Chair. The Governor appoints all members to terms, coterminating with the term of the Governor, who has the authority to terminate a member at will. Do you support the current membership structure?
- Would you support any of the following changes in membership structure?
 - A. The Governor appoints members to fixed, staggered terms
 - B. Counties and cities within each District appoint members
 - C. Counties and cities within each District appoint members who are elected officials
 - D. Expand membership to include Citzens-at-Large
 - E. The public directly elects Council members
 - F. Expand membership by increasing the number of Districts within the Met Council
- Currently, the Governor appoints the Chair of the Met Council. Do you support this process?
- Would you support any of the following changes in the Chair selection process?
 - The membership elects the Chair through an internal process between Council members
 - The Legislature develops a process for selecting a chair
- Currently, only the Governor can replace a member for any reason. Do you support this process?
- Would you support any of the following changes in the member removal process?
 - The Council internally develops a process for removing members
 - The Legislature develops a process for removing members
- Currently, the qualifications for membership in the Met Council include: Must live in the District, Must be knowledgeable about urban and metropolitan affairs, and Must fairly represent the various demographic, political and other interests in the metropolitan area and the districts. Do you support these qualifications?
- How important are the following qualifications for candidate nomination to the Met Council? Candidates have experience in local government. Candidates have subject matter expertise. Candidates represent their District's demographics. Candidates can commit to the time necessary to achieve the Council's objectives.
- Currently the Governor has the responsibility to Appoint a Nomination Committee of 7 members to review applications for Council membership for all 16 Districts. From those applications, the Nomination Committee proposes a slate of candidates to the Governor. The slate of candidates is not made public, and the Governor may choose from this slate or select from outside the slate. Do you support this membership nomination process?
- Would you support any of the following changes to the membership nomination process?
 - Expand the Nomination Committee from 7 to 13 members
 - Expand the Nomination Committee to include elected city and county officials
 - Should District Committees b established to receive nominations for their district representation and make recommendations to the Nomination Committee?
 - Should the proposed slate of candidates be published prior to the Governor selecting the final candidates?
 - Should the Governor explain why he did not appoint from the recommended slate of candidates?
- In your opinion, to who should the membership of the Met Council be ultimately accountable?
 Governor/Legislature/Federal rules mandating the Council/Residents of each District/The Metro Region as a whole/Local elected officials
- In your experience, how well do the Met Council and the Transportation Advisory Board work together?
- In your experience, how fair is the current distribution of Met Council transportation funds to your City or County?
